ANZGOSA Hospital Unit Accreditation

We invite you to apply for ANZGOSA board recognition as a training centre.

The ANZGOSA Post Fellowship Training manual can be found on the ANZGOSA website. This document outlines the requirement to become an Upper GI training centre. .

Applications for potential 2014 Fellows are now closed. Advertisements for 2015 will be placed in the 2014 February Surgical News and the ANZGOSA website. Ultimately accepting a Fellow will be at the discretion of the training unit. Hospital Unit site inspections will occur once you receive a Fellow and Fellow offers occur from late June 2014.

Please note that if a training unit requires accreditation for both HPB and Upper GI then separate applications will need to be made to both ANZHPBA and ANZGOSA.

Post Fellowship Trainees Weekend

The 2014 Post Fellowship Trainees' Weekend will be hosted by ANZHPBA and is being held in Adelaide (SA) at Mt Lofty House, 29th to 31st August. 2014 ANZHPBA and ANZGOSA Fellows will attend. Post Fellowship Training in Upper GI Surgery

Applications are invited from eligible Post Fellowship Trainees for training in Upper GI Surgery. ANZGOSA's Post Fellowship Training Program is for Upper GI surgeons. The program consists of two years education and training following completion of a general surgery fellowship. A portion of the program will include clinical research. A successful Fellowship in Upper GI surgery will involve satisfactory completion of the curriculum requirements, completion of research requirements, minimum of twenty four months clinical training, successful case load achievement, and assessment. Successful applicants will be assigned to an accredited hospital unit.

ANZGOSA Audit

As a practising member of the Association, we would like to invite and encourage you to participate in the ANZGOSA Audit, officially launched on August 31 2010, a bi-national audit of surgical cancer treatment.

Participating in the audit demonstrates both an appreciation of the importance of quality surgical care in this area and a commitment to achieving such quality. Participants will receive an annual participation certificate.

Through the reporting feature of the data entry portal surgeons have access to instant reporting on key areas against aggregated peer results and be able extract their own data for personal analyses. Audit staff will also be able to provide customised analyses if requested.

Collated bi-national data will provide the ANZGOSA opportunities for research into surgical treatment in the two countries. Participants can also make an official data request to gain de-identified information from the database for their own research.

The audit is being conducted on behalf of the ANZGOSA by the Research, Audit and Academic Surgery Division of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons. **College Ethics Committee approval was granted in June 2010** and an application has been made to recognise the audit as an approved activity so that participants can use this to claim points in the College Continuing Professional Development program.

Annual Meeting 2014

2 – 3 October, 2014

The "2014 Conjoint ANZ Upper GI and HPB Meeting" is a two day program and is the ANZHPBA and ANZGOSA annual meeting for next year. Day one will run separate sessions for ANZHPBA and ANZGOSA, and, Day two is combined sessions. The scientific committee is currently putting together a comprehensive and balanced academic programme. The meeting is focused towards a national audience and will be of interest to HPB surgeons, Upper GI surgeons, bariatric surgeons, general surgeons, surgical trainees, gastroenterologists, and oncologists. For those that attended the highly successful 2010 meeting, the venue is again The Millennium Hotel, Queenstown, New Zealand.

We have a fantastic international faculty attending the meeting -

Simon Paterson-Brown

Simon Paterson-Brown qualified from St Mary's Hospital Medical School, London, in 1982 before training in surgery around London, the Home Counties, Hong Kong and Edinburgh. He has been Consultant General and Upper Gastrointestinal Surgeon and Honorary Senior Lecturer in the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh since 1994. His main clinical interests are benign and malignant oesophago-gastric surgery and emergency surgery. He has published widely both in textbooks and journals on emergency surgery, laparoscopic surgery, upper gastro-intestinal surgery, surgical training and assessment. His other interests include patient safety initiatives in surgery, surgical assessment and training. At the present time he is Chairman of the Patient Safety Board of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh and is part of the development team for both NOTSS (Non-technical Skills for Surgeons) and SOS (Safer Operative Surgery) courses, designed to improve intra-operative performance for both surgeons and the whole team. He was previously Clinical Director for Surgery in Lothian University Hospitals and is past-President of the Association of Upper Gastro-intestinal Surgeons of GB and Ireland (AUGIS). His currently on the council of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh.

PROFESSOR J. JAN B. VAN LANSCHOT

J.J.B. (Jan) van Lanschot (1953) is currently Professor of Surgery at the Erasmus Medical Centre and Erasmus University, Rotterdam, the Netherlands. He qualified from the University of Utrecht (1980) and trained at the University Hospital Rotterdam-Dijkzigt (1982-1988), where he wrote his academic thesis on "Metabolic gas exchange in critically ill surgical patients". He spent one year as a basic research fellow with Professor Douglas Wilmore at the Brigham and Women's Hospital (Harvard Medical School, Boston, USA). From 1989 to 1992 he was assistant professor at the University Hospital Rotterdam-Dijkzigt, where he had a postgraduate training in upper GI surgery and in colorectal surgery. In 1993 he became associate professor of surgery in the Academic Medical Centre at the University of Amsterdam where he was appointed Professor of Surgical Oncology in 1999. In 2007 he returned to Rotterdam where he became chairman of the Department of Surgery (2007-2012).

He has held / holds a variety of managerial and executive appointments both locally and (inter-)nationally including programme director for Surgical Training at the AMC in Amsterdam, chairman of the Dutch Society of GI Surgery, board member of the Dutch Society of Surgery, chairman of European Digestive Surgery, chairman of the European Society fot Diseases of the Esophagus, and treasurer of the European Surgical Association. He is editorial board member of several scientific journals, including British Journal of Surgery, Digestive Surgery, Diseases of the Esophagus and World Journal of Surgery. He is honorary member of the Dutch Society of GI Surgery, the Polish Society of Surgical Oncology, the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh and the German Society of General and Visceral Surgery. He received (named) honorary medals of the University of Lublin (Poland), the Dutch Society of Gastroenterology and the Swedish Society of Medicine and Surgery. His research interests currently lie mainly in the field of oesophago-gastric surgery and particularly upper GI cancers. He has published more than 300 peer reviewed articles and more than 50 books / book chapters.

Professor S Michael Griffin

Professor Griffin was born in Newcastle upon Tyne and was educated in Edinburgh at Fettes College. He qualified at the University of Newcastle upon Tyne in 1978 and trained in surgery in the Northern Region. He spent a year at the Chinese University of Hong Kong studying oesophago-gastric cancer surgery and interventional endoscopy. He was appointed as Consultant Surgeon with an Upper GI interest at the Newcastle General Hospital in 1990 and developed the Northern Oesophago-Gastric Cancer Unit at the Newcastle General, setting up the first multi-disciplinary meeting

for oesophago-gastric cancer in the United Kingdom in 1991. The unit moved to the Royal Victoria Infirmary, which has now expanded to include five dedicated oesophago-gastric cancer surgeons. The unit is now the largest in Europe and North America. He is a full-time NHS consultant but was awarded a personal Chair in Surgery at the University of Newcastle upon Tyne in 1999. He has championed the cause of specialization and has been instrumental in the Improving Outcomes programme for oesophageal and stomach cancer by encouraging the centralization of services in the United Kingdom. He continues to provide both general surgical and specialty on call and his major commitment is cancer surgery and therapeutic endoscopy. He has served on the SAC in General Surgery and was President of AUGIS from 2004-2006 and President of the European Society of Diseases of the Esophagus from 2011 to 2013. He is Chairman of the Intercollegiate Specialty Board and has been an expert adviser to NICE, NCEPOD, NHS R&D and the Department of Health. He has been responsible for a number of external reviews of cancer services throughout the UK and abroad and has published widely in the field of oesophago-gastric surgery holding visiting professorships in Europe, the United States and Asia. He is committed to improving surgical standards and education to provide more focused training to allow career development. His real love is rugby, having represented Scotland at international levels. He loves all sport but in particular cricket and football and his support for Sunderland Football Club is well known. He was awarded an OBE for services to cancer healthcare in the recent Queen's Birthday Honours list.

Jüergen Weitz

After graduation of Medical School, University of Heidelberg and completion of his theses at the German Cancer Research Center, Jürgen Weitz received his surgical education at the Department of Surgery, University of Heidelberg and at the Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York. Currently, he is Chairman of the Department of Visceral, Thoracic and Vascular Surgery, University Hospital Carl Gustav Carus, Technical University, Dresden, Germany.

The main focus of his clinical work is the surgical management of patient with complex surgical oncological and Hepato-pancreatico-biliary conditions. He also has a broad background as liver, kidney and pancreas transplant surgeon. Regarding clinical research he has conducted several randomized controlled trials especially in HPB surgery. His translational research interests include detection and characterization of minimal residual disease in malignancies. He has published over 200 peer reviewed papers in the fields of hepato-biliary and pancreatic surgery, transplantation and surgical oncology

Paul D. Grieg

Dr. Greig is Professor of Surgery at the University of Toronto where his academic and clinical focus is in Transplantation and HepatoPancreato-Biliary (HPB) Surgery. He is a Past President of the Canadian Society of Transplantation, former Chair of the Canadian Organ Replacement Register, and former Director of the Multiple Organ & Retrieval Programme of Toronto. He served as the Chair of the Perfusable Organs Subcommittee on the Canadian Standards for Cells Tissues and Organs for Transplantation Committee.

Dr. Greig is the Program Director of the Abdominal Organ Transplant Fellowship (accredited by the American Society of Transplant Surgeons). and the HPB Surgical Oncology Fellowship (accredited by The Fellowship Council). He has served the AHPBA as the Chair of the Education & Training Committee and is the representative to the Board of the Fellowship Council. He has served the ASTS as a member of the Curriculum Committee.

Dr. Greig's research interests are in liver transplantation, in particular disease-specific outcomes and living-donor transplantation, and in HPB Surgical Oncology, in particular outcomes of the multidisciplinary management of hepatocellular carcinoma.
